Sample Fidelity Checklist for Comprehension

This sample checklist helps administrators and instructional coaches (ICs) monitor comprehension fidelity during walk-throughs. It can serve as a tool for ICs to guide educators in planning instructional delivery and as a self-monitoring tool during and after instructional delivery for teachers.
